

When needed, the families get nominated from the hospital by a social worker and will run into BHH let them know who they are working with and help them out. I am not positive on how much money we raised but they raised a lot because we've helped over 3,000 families. And the Parade of Pumpkins are sponsoring Mary Ann and she is 51 years old." There were also two more stands, we had Liliana Pagano at the goody stand and Jesse Costalas at the food stands. There were treats at the stands including "candy, cookies, cupcakes, other baked goods, and glow sticks." Liliana noted.

It was really nice that the school chooses to support this cause and hopefully the families who need it use it wisely.

Chesterbrook hopes that next year's Parade of Pumpkins will be as fun as this year's. Mrs. Capotrio, the third grade teacher and organizer of Parade of Pumpkins at CBA says, "There was about 120 pumpkins at the parade." At this fundraising event, the Chesterbrook Academy raised \$1,200 for BHH. 5th grade student, Rhett Bower, states, "It was really nice that the school chooses to support this cause and hopefully the families who need it use it wisely." Katie Mina was quoted, "I was very happy that

n the night of October 21st 2016 the 3rd grade students of Chesterbrook Academy ran the 13th annual Pumpkin Parade trying to raise money for Bringing Hope Home.Bringing Hope Home is an organization that raises money for people and family's that are suffering from cancer and need financial help. Chesterbrook Academy and Parade of Pumpkins have been connected with BHH for 3 years. This year 3rd grade raised \$1,200 for BHH.

Paul Isenberg the founder of the Bringing Hope Home started the charity because of his experiences when his own wife was diagnosed with cancer. During her battle with cancer Mr. Isenberg and his wife's friends were very supportive. When Mr. Isenberg visited Chesterbrook Academy he told students about how helpful his friends were with cooking, cleaning, and helping out. When his wife passed away, he wanted to share the generosity with other people than needed help when they were sick.

To raise money for his organization, Mr. Isenberg gathered all of his close friends and started to raise money with a fundraising event. This event was named the Great Guys Dinner. According to BHH's website, the first Great Guys Dinner

took place in 2001, gathered 100 guys and raised \$13,000 that was donated to various cancer charities. Also according to the website "Nicole's "small idea" of having a dinner with close friends has now evolved into Bringing Hope Home. The Great Guys Dinner continues to be Bringing Hope Home's largest event, and raised over \$395,000 in 2015 alone.

To help this local organization that does a lot for families in need we focus on one family and raise money for them by selling pumpkins, candy, food, glow in the dark bracelets and drink with this money they can pay for mortgage, groceries, medical bills and whatever they need help paying for.





MEATBALL BOMBS RECIPE

INGREDIENTS:

- 1 can (12 oz) refrigerated biscuits
- 8 cooked Italian-style meatballs
- 1 cup marinara/pasta sauce
- 1 cup shredded cheese
- 4 tablespoons butter, melted
- 2 garlic cloves, minced
- 1/2 teaspoon Italian seasoning
- pinch of salt

DIRECTIONS:

- Preheat oven to 350°F. Line a baking sheet with parchment paper or a silicone baking mat. Set aside.
- Using your hands or a rolling pin, flatten each biscuit into a 4 inch round.
- Place 1 meatball and 2 tablespoons marinara in center of each dough round. Top with 2 tablespoons of cheese.
- Wrap dough around meatball and cheese, pressing edges to seal.
 Place seam side down, leaving room for spreading on prepared baking sheet.
 Continue until all biscuits have been completed.
- In a small bowl, whisk together melted butter, garlic, Italian seasoning and salt. Evenly spoon on top of each biscuit.
- 6. Bake for 18 to 20 minutes, or until golden brown. Serve warm!
